Bearing in mind that the Voluntary, like the liturgy that precedes it, is an offering to God's glory, the congregation is asked to be seated or depart quietly. It is requested that there be no applause. All are invited to a reception downstairs in the undercroft after the service.

Notes on the Music: This service is the second of three services of Choral Evensong held in this, St. Peter's 150th anniversary year. The music at this service comes from the first part of St. Peter's founding, having been written on both sides of the turn of the last century.

The service opens with the beautifully crafted setting of "When rooks fly homeward" by the Irish poet Joseph Campbell. The music, by **Arthur Baynon (1889–1954)**, was written in about 1950. This is a beloved piece at Evensongs at St. Peter's

The canticles are the grand Evening Service in B minor by **Thomas Tertius Noble (1867–1953)**. Born in England the year before St. Peter's was founded, Noble was an influential church musician on both sides of the Atlantic. Noble's *Evening Service in B minor, Op. 6,* was written in 1898, the year Noble began his tenure at York Minster. Noble concluded his tenure at York Minster in 1913, emigrated to America and became the Organist and Choirmaster at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in New York City. Because of his position in this influential parish, Noble's music is still widely sung in Episcopal churches today, including St. Peter's.

In this Epiphany Season of unfolding light and revelation, the anthem is "Hail, gladdening light" by **Charles Wood (1886–1926)**. This large-scale work for double choir, written in 1919, achieves luminescence through shifting textures and the interplay between the ensembles.

The final hymn, "Savior again to thy dear Name we raise" returns us to the time of St. Peter's founding. This hymn, which is popular throughout the English-speaking world, is most often sung to *Ellers*, a tune written by **Edward John Hopkins (1818–1901)** in 1869. Hopkins was organist of the Temple Church in London from 1843 to 1898.

One of the most significant events in St. Louis at the turn of the last century was the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exhibition, better known as the St. Louis World's Fair. The organ at the fair's Festival Hall was built by the Los Angeles Art Organ Company. It was the largest organ in the world at the time, and still exists today in the John Wanamaker Department Store (now a Macy's) in downtown Philadelphia.

The official organist for the World's Fair was Charles Galloway, who only a few years later, assumed the post of Organist & Choirmaster here at St. Peter's. A plaque commemorating Galloway hangs in the narthex. Galloway was a pupil of **Alexandre Guilmant (1837–1911)** in Paris. Guilmant dedicated his Organ Sonata No. 7, Op. 89, written in 1902, to Galloway.

Upcoming Choral Services and Concert

The third and final Evensong of this sesquicentennial season will be held Sunday, March 10, at 5:00 p.m., and will feature a fully American expression of music for this liturgy. The canticles are the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in D by Leo Sowerby, and the anthem is by Gregory Roig, who is a member of the St. Peter's Singers. This service will include the first performance of a new set of Preces and Responses written for St. Peter's 150th anniversary by David Sinden.

A Meditation on the Passion of Christ will be held Palm Sunday, April 14 at 5:00 p.m. Through scripture, poetry, music, and prayer, this service contemplates the way of the cross.

The St. Peter's Choir will sing a concert entitled "From One Generation to Another." The concert, which includes Aaron Copland's ground-breaking masterwork *In the Beginning*, will be held Sunday, June 2 at 4:00 p.m. The concert is free and all are welcome.



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
