HYMN FESTIVAL: "OUR HOPE FOR YEARS TO COME"

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Welcome to St. Peter's Church! We are glad you are here and invite you to join us this evening as we worship and give thanks to God. Wherever you find yourself in your spiritual journey, know that you are welcome here as we seek to know and serve God through worship, education, service, and fellowship. To learn more about life at St. Peter's Church, please sign the Visitors' Register in the entry hall.

This Hymn Festival draws together themes of faith, prayer, ministry, and the mission of the church as we celebrate our first 150 years. Special attention has been paid to hymns that originate from this country. The hymn tune NETTLETON, for instance, originates from the early nineteenth century and is beloved for its long association with the words "Come, thou fount of every blessing."

Richard Wayne Dirksen was the Precentor, Organist, and Choirmaster of the Washington National Cathedral. In 1982 he wrote the tune WYNGATE CANON for the words by William Walsham How for the Feast of the Confession of St. Peter (January 18). This hymn, **"You are the Christ, O Lord"** is often sung here at St. Peter's at commemorations of our Patron. Dirksen also composed the splendid festival setting of the hymn **"Rejoice! ye pure in heart"** for the installation of the Most Rev. John M. Allin as Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church at the National Cathedral in 1974. His full, festive treatment of VINEYARD HAVEN is sung at this festival.

Alec Wyton was Organist and Choirmaster of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis before moving to the Cathedral of the Diocese of New York. In 1976 Wyton wrote the marvelous unison tune COBURN, which is included in the Hymnal 1982 at Hymn 363. Today, we sing this tune to a different hymn text about our work in the kingdom of God.

Ronald Arnatt succeeded Wyton at Organist and Choirmaster of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis in 1954, and worked there for 25 years. Arnatt was an influential figure in the music of the Episcopal Church, and in St. Louis's musical life. He founded the St. Louis Chamber Chorus in 1956. In 1995, Arnatt composed the festive arrangement of **"Holy God, we praise thy Name"** that concludes this festival. It is dedicated to "John Walsh and the Choir of the Church of St. Gabriel the Archangel, St. Louis, Missouri, for the sixtieth anniversary of the church." The concluding Voluntary was written for Emmanuel, Webster Groves. Arnatt died on August 23 of this year.

The Indiana-born composer **Ned Rorem** found the words **"All glorious God, what hymns of praise"** in the very first Episcopal Hymnal, the set of hymns (words only, no tunes) bound with the first American Book of Common Prayer in 1789. This hymn, numbered 15, was also included in the 1826 Hymnal, though it left the official Episcopal repertoire in the next revision. The words of this hymn are well suited to All Saints' Day.

The new hymn tune LADUE was written for this Festival by **Stephen Buzard**, the Organist and Choirmaster of St. James Cathedral, Chicago.

HAT THEN is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ.

THIRD LESSON John 4: 31–38

EANWHILE the disciples were urging him, "Rabbi, eat something." But he said to them, "I have food to eat that you do not know about." So the disciples said to one another, "Surely no one has brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to complete his work. Do you not say, 'Four months more, then comes the harvest? But I tell you, look around you, and see how the fields are ripe for harvesting. The reaper is already receiving wages and is gathering fruit for eternal life, so that sower and reaper may rejoice together. For here the saying holds true, 'One sows and another reaps.'
