





Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.



MUSIC NOTES: The familiar Basque carol "The angel Gabriel" receives a rich, treatment from the English choral composer Jim Clements (b. 1983). The word "Gloria" opens the carol and is singled out for special treatment • American composer Gerald Near (b. 1942) studied composition with Leo Sowerby and Dominick Argento. He is a prolific composer of sacred music and is well represented in the Hymnal 1982. His setting of the medieval carol text "There is no rose" features each section of the choir in turn: sopranos, altos, tenors, and basses. Near continues an active career as a church musician and currently serves as Parish Administrator and Director of Music at St. Francis in the Valley, Green Valley, Arizona. • The organ music before and after the service is based on a traditional chant melody for the Magnificat, or Song of Mary (Luke 1:46–55).
