The Lessons

Lector: A Reading from The Book of The Acts of the Apostles. (1: 6-14)

So when they had come together, they asked Jesus, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew,

Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.


Lector: A Reading from The First Letter of Peter. (4: 12–14; 5: 6–11)

Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. If you are reviled for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the spirit of glory, which is the Spirit of God, is resting on you. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, so that he may exalt you in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you. Discipline yourselves, keep alert. Like a roaring lion your adversary the devil prowls around, looking for someone to devour. Resist him, steadfast in your faith, for you know that your brothers and sisters in all the world are undergoing the same kinds of suffering. And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one."

We celebrate that we are now hidden with you in God and we pray saying: Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

> We pray for your Church O Lord, a temporal expression of your love in the world. We pray for Justin, Archbishop of Canterbury; Michael, our presiding Bishop; for the Diocesan Standing Committee and Deon, our Bishop-elect; for the people of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, and for their interim priest; for Rob, Kelly, and Joseph, our clergy; for our staff and the people of St. Peter's; that as followers of Jesus we would have the courage to love as Jesus loves;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ. People:

> We pray for the leaders of the world, that, in the midst of their posturing and threats, they would know that you are the one true ruler, risen, ascended, and enthroned in glory. Help our leaders and all humanity know that true leadership is a life of service and pursuit of justice for all;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

We pray with gratitude for the wonder of your creation, Lord. Help us be wise stewards of the beauty you have given us that the generations to come will live in a world that continues to remind them of the wonder of your power and might;

We pray, Lord, for people who feel alone in our community and need the assurance of human warmth. Help us as the community of St. Peter's to unlock the Kingdom of your love here on earth by opening and growing our hearts of compassion;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

We pray for people who despair in times of sickness, grief, unemployment, imprisonment, and afflictions of every kind, that they know the hope of Christ. We pray especially for people on our hearts today...especially for Brooke Erwin, Fran Kempton, Bryan Miller, Linda Morotz, Ned Lemkemeier, Greyson Schnoebelen, Carl Schuldt and Julie Stephenson. Help us to be bearers of hope and love for those who suffer;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

We pray for our loved ones who have died and gone before us into the fullness of your presence... And we pray for people who grieve, that our presence in their lives will be a comfort in their time of loss;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

We pray for ourselves – the people of St. Peter's – as we contemplate re-entry from our pandemic isolation. Guide us by your Spirit to make wise decisions that are safe and sane for all members of our community;

Pray for us Lord Jesus Christ.

Priest:

Lord Jesus Christ, you have ascended into glory, and are seated at the right hand of God Almighty. We thank you for being the God who understands our humanity and the world in which we live. We thank you for interceding for us and giving us your Holy Spirit. Prepare our hearts for a fresh infilling of your Holy Spirit this Pentecost and make us one with each other and one with you hidden in the heart of God. Amen.

We lift our hearts to the Lord and give God thanks and praise.


It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

TODAY...

RE-ENTRY PLANS AND COFFEE WITH THE RECTOR – When we closed the church we said we would review the decision at the end of May. With the proposed relaxation of the "Stay at Home" orders, we are continuing to review and prepare for our re-entry. Based on conversation with many parishioners at last Sunday's forum, our vestry and staff and watching the St. Louis county's new infection rates continuing to be high, (they jumped from 34 to 62 in the last 24 hours) it seems very unwise to re-open, especially for public worship, in the first two weeks of June. So we will continue our current practice at least until June 14.

We are continuing to explore our options and will continue to offer services and programming online and via Zoom. When we eventually re-open we anticipate continuing to offer our Sunday worship online as we gradually introduce small in person worship services that satisfies the physical distancing requirements. We are also considering some events on the lawn. We will continue those conversations this Sunday at the Coffee with the Rector forum. Join Rob via a live Zoom chat at 10:30.
