The Lessons

Lector: A Reading from The Book of the prophet Isaiah. (6: 1-8) *sit*

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. MUSIC NOTES: The Offertory Anthem comes from an unfinished oratorio by *Felix Mendelssohn (1809–1847)*. Mendelssohn was still writing the music of this oratorio, posthumously given the name *Christus*, in the last year of his life. It is believed that Mendelssohn’s title for the completed oratorio would have been *Erde, Himmel, und Hölle (Earth, Heaven, and Hell)*. • The words of the anthem sung at Communion are, with one exception, the same as the Collect for Guidance found on page 832 of the Prayer Book. The only difference is the first word which was “prevent” in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. In this older sense of the word intended here, the prayer asks that God go before us. • The organ music, also by *Mendelssohn*, was commissioned by the English publisher Coventry and Hollier who sought a set of voluntaries for Anglican liturgies. Not being entirely clear on what a “voluntary” was, Mendelssohn wrote six Sonatas. Today, the music is used as it was intended by the publisher: as music before and after the service.
