MUSIC NOTES: It is sometimes said that every Sunday is a "little Easter." It is all the more so when we encounter a reading like today's Epistle Lesson from I Corinthians. Words from this lesson are sung at the Offertory in a setting by *John Joubert*. Joubert was born in Cape Town, South Africa in 1927. He was educated in Anglican schools there where he received a thorough grounding in music. His Evensong anthem "O Lorde, the maker of al thing" won the Novello anthem competition in 1952. His carols "Torches" and "There is no rose" are immensely popular at Christmastime. Joubert's music is thoroughly modern, but never out of reach for performer or hearer. He wrote that he wanted his music "to be understood, enjoyed and used." The Choir's singing of *Christ is risen* this morning was planned long before we received word of Joubert's death last month at age 91.
