The Lessons

Lector: A Reading from The Book of the Acts of the Apostles. (9: 1-6) *sit*

Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do."

Priest: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
(21: 1-19)

People: **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off. When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many,

the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead. When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."

MUSIC NOTES: “Christ Lag in Todesbanden” (“Christ lay in death’s strong bands”) is a setting of an Easter chorale originally composed by Martin Luther, with help from Johann Walter. It was first published in 1524 in the Erfurt Enchiridion and in Walter's chorale hymnal, “Eyn Geystliche gesangk Buchleyn.” It appears as hymn 186 in The Hymnal 1982. Leon Boëllmann was a student of Gustav Lefèvre and Eugène Gigout. Gigout thought of Boëllmann as a son and even raised his three children after the untimely deaths of Boëllmann and his wife. Suite Gothique, Op. 25, was composed in 1895 and is an important contribution to the organ repertoire. The Toccata is the most famous movement of the work.

SPECIAL CELEBRATION – The Rev. Kelly Carlson, David Sinden, and members of the St. Peter’s Choir have been invited to lead Morning Prayer **this morning** at the 50th anniversary of the re-hallowing of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Aldermanbury in Fulton, Missouri. The church, now part of America’s National Churchill Museum, was originally built in London and designed by Christopher Wren. After being bombed in World War II, the church was moved stone by stone and rebuilt in Fulton in 1969. It is the only Wren church in America. The church and the museum are on the campus of Westminster College where Churchill gave his “Iron Curtain” speech on March 5, 1946 (and Kelly earned her undergraduate degree in 1987). Participants in today’s worship service include the Rev. Canon Jonathan Brewster, residentiary Canon and Treasurer of St. Paul’s Cathedral, London, the Rt. Hon. Lord Watson of Richmond, C.B.E., former president of England’s Liberal Party, and St. Peter’s parishioner Sandy Peters serving as Crucifer.
