



MUSIC NOTES: In this Easter season, the Choir is singing the proper Psalm to Anglican Chant. The psalm for today is the beloved Psalm 23 sung to a chant by *Jeffrey Smith* (b. 1960), the Director of Music at St. Paul's, K Street, Washington, DC. • In the Collect of the Day, the Psalm, and the Gospel all have imagery of the "good shepherd." The Easter Motet *Surrexit a mortuis, Op. 23, No. 3* takes up this same phrase, but in stentorian tones. *Charles-Marie Widor (1844–1937)* was the *titulaire* organist of Saint-Sulpice in Paris where he presided over the large Cavaille-Coll organ in the church's West end for sixtyfour years. At Saint-Sulpice the choir and the smaller choir organ were located in the East end. In a grand Motet like *Surrexit* the two organs and choir volleyed back and forth across the immense Baroque space. In the version heard today, the massive interjections of sound and the accompaniment for the choir come from a single organ. • *Maurice Duruflé (1902–1986)* was another long-tenured organist in Paris. He was the titular organist of St-Étienne-du-Mont from 1930 until his death.
