

COMMUNITY DURING COVID OUR FAITH-FILLED RESPONSE

On March 11, 2020, the Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, the Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, issued a statement supporting suspension of in-person gatherings for public worship in response to the first wave of COVID-19 in the United States. Eight months on, the St. Louis area is experiencing a third wave of the pandemic. St. Peter's has responded to the historic challenges to being church posed by the pandemic in creative, loving, and faithful ways. Since March, we have been gathering online for worship, fellowship, and formation. Since July, the main sanctuary has been open for personal devotion every week. For the last two months, we have been gathering in-person on our campus to celebrate Holy Eucharist, share coffee and conversation, bless backpacks and animals, and celebrate St. Peter's Day. And small outdoor gatherings of families to celebrate baptisms, weddings, and the lives of loved ones who have died have taken place.

In all of these efforts, St. Peter's has been guided by the work of our Reopening Steering Group, made up of vestry members, parish physicians, staff, and clergy. In the face of ever-changing variables, this group has kept before it the constant goal of resuming in-person gatherings at the corner of Warson and Ladue, in a manner that responsibly protects the health of parishioners, staff and clergy. This has meant keeping a constant watch on pandemic statistics, in light of guidelines and criteria outlined by our Diocesan Bishop, and drawing on the experience and expertise of the physicians in the group in determining when and how to gather together.


The work of reopening will continue into 2021, as our country works to conquer the threats posed by COVID-19. Know that the Reopening Steering Group is committed to helping St. Peter's serve the needs and desires of all parishioners during these times when we cannot yet fully reopen to resume church life as it was prior to the pandemic. We will get there! Slowly, but surely... and safely, with God's help. In the meantime, we continue to be the church, and gathering together and being here for one another, in creative, loving and faithful ways. Thanks be to God!

WHERE ARE WE?


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The pandemic has had a way of creating unanticipated challenges to the timely completion of projects and goals the world over, including calling a new rector! But your Search Committee has been working diligently over the last seven months, and today . . .

We move forward in faith and hope.

Thanks to great participation from parishioners, the Search Committee completed the congregation self-study portion of the search process. Nearly 200 individuals participated in the Holy Cow! survey and another 100+ shared their thoughts in "Holy Conversations." Your feedback was essential to be able to create a parish profile that allows prospective candidates to see who we are, where we came from, where we hope to go, and what we seek in our next rector. This profile is in its final phase of completion and will then be submitted for approval.

Once approved, the profile will be published on our website and the committee will begin collecting resumes of candidates.



COMING TOGETHER IN WORSHIP

How is a church to worship God with thanks and praise when a pandemic forces it to shut its doors? It relies on its Director of Communications to take a crash course in online gathering technologies and videography (kudos Jacquelyn!) and then it gets CREATIVE!

Indeed, ever since its Lenten introduction, our Sunday service of Spiritual Communion has been a spirit-filled online experience, thanks to the faithful and generous participation of so many:

- Lectors (and parishioners of all ages!) sharing lessons, leading us in prayer, and joyfully responding to the Peace and Dismissal;
- Choir members singing acapella our praise to God, and David thoughtfully choosing hymns and anthems from St. Peter's library of recorded choral music;
- Clergy giving their all to the oddity of preaching to a little dot of a camera;
- Jacquelyn taking all the disparate pieces and creating a cohesive worship service, on paper and video "tape"; and
- Parishioners and friends worshiping God together by tuning to St. Peter's YouTube page, whether at 8:00 a.m. on Sunday or any time throughout the week!

We also worship together "live" online. If ever you find your spirits low on a Sunday morning at 10:15, remind yourself that age is just a number and join the joyful chaos that is Children's Chapel via zoom! Looking for a way to begin each day in conversation with God? And, at long last, patience was rewarded in September with the return of in-person worship – the celebration of Holy Eucharist on the front porch! To be "face-to-face" even with our faces masked and remaining socially distanced (sometimes in mittens and hats!), gives a special joy to worship and deepens our gratitude for gifts we no longer take for granted. Thank you for continuing to make reservations to attend in-person worship!



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True to almost all plans made during this pandemic, our worship plans are subject to change. St. Peter's Reopening Steering Group is committed to serving the spiritual and pastoral needs of the parish in ways that safeguard the health and safety of parishioners, staff, clergy and their families. In consultation with Bishop Johnson, we pay close attention to markers of the pandemic's presence in St. Louis County and reassess our plans in response to updated information. The best place to find the latest worship updates remains Friday's News from the Rock; if you do not have access to the internet, please let us know by leaving a voicemail message at the church office. Also, everyone who has made a reservation to attend a worship service will be contacted if plans for that particular service change.

Living in the midst of a worldwide pandemic can make a lot of life feel uncertain. But some things we know for sure:

Even when we are apart, God makes us one.

Even when we cannot receive Holy Communion, God continues to feed us with the love of Christ.

Even when we feel utterly alone, we are a beloved part of the body of Christ called "St. Peter's Church" and the love of God is with us.

Even when all feels uncertain, there is always reason to gather together to worship God with thanks and praise, be it in traditional or new and creative ways.



THE SAME PATH TO HEAVEN

After I graduated from college, I worked at an Episcopal camp in upstate New York for several summers.¹ One year, we wanted to use our outdoor chapel, a beautiful shady spot overlooking a pond, but we realized that no one had cut the grass that year. The grass in front of the stone altar had been growing all summer, and it was very long.

We met there anyway, and that service of Holy Communion was one of the most memorable I have experienced. As campers and counselors came forward to receive Communion, we wove a wide circle in the grass, first toward the altar, and then away.

What emerged was an outward and visible sign that I have long remembered. When we worship, we offer and present unto God, "our selves, our souls and bodies." That day, bent blades bore witness to our bodies' path and our souls' transformation: our community's intersection with God's grace.

In this time of pandemic, our bodies weave strange, socially distanced paths. We are engaging with our church and our faith online and outside. But even while we do so, our souls long to take the well-worn path to our church's altar. "How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?" Right now, singing cannot happen the same way as before.

But the Psalms also command us, "Sing a new song unto the Lord." So even if our bodies remain distant, our souls seek harmony with God and one another. We are called to tread a new path.

This year we will continue offering Music for Meditation from the organ on Sundays. Young people, including our returning Choristers, are invited to Songs and Stories, a chorister training program that will take place online. The Parish Choir will record new virtual offerings for various services. And all year long, we will celebrate 30 years of Choral Evensong at St. Peter's with the Living Tradition series.

In the circular path of that outdoor chapel, I saw evidence of a congregation coming to worship. I know that God still calls us to worship him, even if our paths don't quite cross for a while. But we are still called to sing a new song on this journey of faith. So, let us rejoice in knowing there are hidden paths for all of us woven by the saints and by our God.

Our glorious Leader claims our praise for his own pattern given; while the long cloud of witnesses show the same path to heaven.




DURING THIS TIME WHEN WE CANNOT MAKE MUSIC IN CONVENTIONAL WAYS, THE ST. PETER'S MUSICIANS ARE FINDING NEW WAYS TO STAY CONNECTED TO EACH OTHER AND TO THEIR MINISTRY. ALONG THE WAY, WE HOPE TO SING NEW SONGS AND EXPLORE OUR LIVING TRADITION OF MUSIC AND LITURGY.

In March of 2020, just before the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, St. Peter's Church celebrated a milestone: 30 years of regular services of Choral Evensong.

We had hoped to celebrate this anniversary with a festive series of Choral Evensong services in the 2020/21 season. But with in-person worship and singing off the table for the foreseeable future, we begin this series in a new way: a virtual celebration of music and liturgy at St. Peter's that we're calling Living Tradition. This series includes music, online liturgical offerings, and conversations about our tradition of music and worship with a special emphasis on Evensong.



LONGING FOR HOME



On Thursday, October 1, St. Peter's held a virtual CD release party for Longing for Home, the St. Peter's Choir's new recording with Regent Records. Longing for Home is a recording of different hymn texts set to music by American composers, many of whom are still living. At the party, we welcomed many of the composers of music on the disc, including Dale Adelman (Atlanta, Ga.), Frank Boles (Indianapolis, Ind.), David Hurd (via video message from Yonkers, N.Y.), Robert Lehman (who was visiting Chautauqua, N.Y.), William Bradley Roberts (Richmond, Va.), Martha Shaffer (St. Louis, Mo.), and David Ashley White (Houston, Tex.). We were also very pleased to welcome Scott Roberts, former Assistant Organist at St. Peter's, who played the organ accompaniments on the recording. At the party, David Sinden announced that a generous donor has purchased copies of Longing for Home for all St. Peter's parishioners who would like one.

VIRTUAL CHOIR

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The St. Peter's Choir has been dispersed since early March, but they continue to explore new ways to make music virtually. The process of recording separately involves a lot of coordination, and some technical know-how from all involved. Using this technique, the choir has recorded familiar anthems and new compositions written specifically for this method of music-making. One such recording was made expressly for the Ordination of Bishop Deon Johnson in June.

SONGS AND STORIES



The youngest members of the St. Peter's Choir are the St. Peter's Choristers. Choristers-in-training are called Probationers. When our regular schedule was suspended in March, the Choir Room was hosting a total of 2 hours and 45 minutes of rehearsals for Choristers and Probationers weekly. This year, our virtual chorister training program for all ages is called Songs and Stories (http://songsandstories.online). Through stories from the bible, stories of the saints, we are learning about our roots of faith. Through hymns and other pieces of music old and new we are singing our hope-filled Christian story. Even our choir mascot, Scrawny MacNugget is lending a hand — or, should we say a wing? — with this project!

ZOOM CHOIR GATHERING

From the very first Thursday night that they were unable to rehearse in the Choir Room, David Sinden has hosted a weekly hangout for the St. Peter's Choir on Zoom. They were even mentioned in an article in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch in April ("The rise of the Zoom happy hour: St. Louisans move their social lives online," by Aisha Sultan). These hangouts are continuing weekly until in-person rehearsals resume.



CHOIR TEA





Each video includes a single hymn, played on the St. Peter's organ, and the words on-screen for you to sing along from home.

MUSIC FOR MEDITATION

When the St. Peter's staff were permitted to return to the church building in July, David Sinden was glad to discover that our Mander organ in the church was in excellent form. Within a few weeks, we began a weekly music series on Sunday mornings called Music for Meditation. These 25-minute programs were offered while the church was open for personal prayer. We plan to continue offering music like this, and we look forward to making it available online as well.

A CALL TO MINISTRY


This summer Shug Goodlow officially began her service at St. Peter's as an intern. Shug was a postulant for Holy Orders at that time and her internship was part of her formation on the journey toward ordination. Shug came to us from Christ Church Cathedral where she worshipped for more than 25 years with her wife Doris. Shug was actively engaged in the worship life, mission and ministry of the Cathedral where she most recently served as Head Verger and Acolyte Master. She has been involved in Cathedral and diocesan governance for many years and is the immediate past president of the Standing Committee. She was elected a deputy to General Convention at the last diocesan convention. She is also a licensed preacher in the diocese.

Shug was recently granted Candidacy for the Priesthood by Bishop Deon Johnson. She will be ordained as a Transitional Deacon on January 23, 2021. She will then be ordained a priest about six months later.

Deacons in the Episcopal Church are called to a "special ministry of servanthood directly under the bishop. They are to serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick and the lonely." A deacon is to "interpret to the church the needs, concerns and hopes of the world." (BCP p. 543). In addition to those ordained permanent deacons, there are also "transitional deacons" who are ordained a deacon as a preliminary step toward ordination as a priest. This practice is required by the canons of the Episcopal Church.

Shug is involved in community theatre and is passionate about movies; she has seen The Godfather 190 times! She also enjoys trivia and knows all kinds of useless information. She loves to cook and particularly enjoys baking. Shug and her wife Doris are residents of Kirkwood. They have two daughters, Simone and Monica, and a granddaughter, Khloe, who is a sophomore at Temple University. Their son Edward was called home by the ancestors and is the family's guardian angel.

Shug and Doris are very much enjoying parish life and ministry at St. Peter's as Shug continues to discern her call to the priesthood. You can find her officiating Morning Prayer on Wednesday mornings and participating in many aspects of worship on Sunday mornings, whether serving as a lector, preaching, leading Children's Chapel, or participating in Coffee with the Rector. In an episode of Law and Order, former Assistant D.A. Jamie Ross is in a tough spot – the ethics committee is considering charges that could mean her disbarment – when her former boss, Executive Assistant D.A. Jack McCoy offers her this observation: "Life's a funny old dog. . . ."

So far, the year 2020 has confirmed Jack's wisdom – we have discovered first-hand just how funny an old dog life can be! We find ourselves living in a way none of us ever anticipated. All of us are isolated from our "normal" routines of school, work, family, service, worship, play. . . . Everything feels less certain, more complicated.

What is our response, as followers of Jesus Christ, when life shows itself to be a funny old dog, tilting our world at steep, uninvited and disconcerting angles? A priest and brother of the Society of St. John the Evangelist whose words regularly offer me wisdom, Br. David Vryhof, offered an answer in reference to the pandemic that has stuck with me:

"What do we, as people of faith, have to offer our neighbors and colleagues in such demanding times? We are called to be people of hope, whose trust in God gives them the resilience to pick themselves up when they've fallen or been pushed down, and to continue to answer the call. We must be like sturdy trees, able to stand their ground in the face of violent winds because their roots reach deep into the soil from which comes their food and their strength."

2020 is a year when many of us have had to dig deep, to draw from the faith upon which we have built our lives. Connecting with the steadfast love of God, the love that against all odds brought life from death in Jesus Christ, is what makes us a people of hope in 2020.

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And the wonderful gift of being a part of the community of faith we call St. Peter's Episcopal Church is that we can be hope for one another. That is what pastoral care has been all about this year.

- Parishioners staying in touch with one another in the St. Peter's Caring Circles.
- Parishioners, led by our St. Peter's Cares Shepherds, writing notes to our "mostly at home" and other parishioners, reminding them that their church loves them in the midst of isolation.
- Hand delivery of Forward Day by Day booklets, wrapped in parish greetings, to many isolated by the pandemic.
- Finding novel ways to celebrate the love of Christ in parish families, with weddings and baptisms on the front steps of the church and in the Laird Garden.

- Parishioner-led parades and other socially-distanced celebrations of milestone birthdays this summer (happy 100th Eveline!).
- Clergy walking with families through times of loss and grief when our "normal" traditions of mourning and supporting one another are unavailable to us.
- Clergy beginning to make in-person pastoral visits, as hospitals and other facilities slowly relax their prohibitions against visitors.
- And the tireless service of the St. Peter's Cares Ministry Team members in praying, providing meals, and (yes!) providing transportation in the midst of a pandemic, with Shepherds Frances Gay and Nancy Grimes faithfully responding to every parishioner's request.

A huge THANK YOU to all of St. Peter's pastoral care providers. As 2020 continues, and turns into 2021, we will continue to share hope with one another, reaching out with love and caring when the funny old dog of life leaves someone in need of that gift.

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The past summer has been one of great sadness for all of us as we watched our nation struggle with systemic racism, its ripple effects felt throughout society. Long before George Floyd's death in May, generations of St. Louisans had worked diligently and faithfully to address these issues and build bridges across racial and socioeconomic lines; that work has intensified in 2020. In my time among you as one of your priests, I have asked myself, "What role can the community of St. Peter's play in addressing the racism in St. Louis city and county, and in our larger American society?"

Our community needs to continue to build on the work we have been doing, to develop a more profound knowledge and understanding of our nation's racial history and how that racism has impacted our city and county. Addressing racism needs to fundamentally focus on two distinct and interrelated areas: understanding, which will open the door for meaningful and deep reconciliation, and justice, which will flow out of a heart made tender and longing for thy kingdom come. To this end, St. Peter's has formed an 11-member anti-racism core group, divided into two teams: inward-facing (understanding) and outward-facing (justice).

INWARD-FACING

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The inward-facing team focuses primarily on helping parishioners understand structural racism in our community and how white privilege permeates the way we live in society. This small group of people has dedicated themselves to creating conversation groups and book studies that will help us to open our minds and our hearts. A study of the book and film *Just Mercy* was its first offering.

OUTWARD-FACING

The outward-facing team's work is engaged in ministry that will allow St. Peter's to offer our time, talent, treasure, and sweat equity toward building justice in our community.

In conjunction with the Outreach Committee, this team has begun conversations with the Tabernacle Community Development Corporation (TCDC), an organization created in 2010 in the Jeff-Vander-Lou neighborhood. TCDC provides a variety of benevolent resources to the community, allowing the organization to build loyal and trusting relationships with neighborhood residents, local law enforcement, government officials, and neighboring non-profits.

St. Peter's has a rich history of reaching out. Now is the time to use our community's talents and resources to continue to build a legacy of supporting justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly with our God.






2020 FINANCIAL FORECAST

Due to the pandemic and subsequent closure of our buildings and campus, 2020 has been a challenging year. During the first quarter, the 2020 financial forecast was revised to more accurately reflect anticipated income and expenses. Funds from the Cares Act PPP (Payroll Protection Program) in the amount of \$227,600 allowed us to help manage the gap. We are optimistic that the PPP loan will be forgiven in full in 2021.



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SANCTUARY

Audiovisual enhancements are in the works within the sanctuary. The AVID Group, Inc., a local installation company, has been hired to upgrade the sound system and microphones. Cameras are also being installed which will allow us the ability to live stream worship services in the very near future.



INTERIOR & EXTERIOR PAINTING

All trim and soffits around the guttering are being freshly painted on the church's exterior. Facilities guru Jerry Wille has been working to paint interior hallways, the lobby, and a few areas within the church office. An elusive leak in the office lobby has been fixed and the water-damaged wall has been repaired.



COLUMBARIUM & EXTERIOR STAIRWELL

To preserve the columbarium, tuckpointing repairs have been made to mortar joints and broken bricks have been replaced. Additionally, deteriorated areas within the exterior stairwell leading to the lower parking lot have been fixed.

GROUNDS

In June, several parishioners cleaned the grounds and weeded garden beds. Two large trees that have fallen during windstorms have been removed.
