I, too, have reason for confidence in the flesh. If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. 

MUSIC NOTES: The English composer Herbert Howells (1892–1983) had a long association with King's College, Cambridge, and eventually completed a full cycle of service music for the Anglican liturgy for that place: Morning Prayer, Communion, and Matins. The services, all published with the college's Latin name Collegium Regale were written over the span of about 12 years. The Office of Holy Communion was written last, in 1956, but is cut from the same musical cloth as the rest of the music Howells wrote for King's. The opening chords of the Kyrie are the same as those of the Magnificat he wrote in 1945. • The anthem Thee will I love was written in 1970. As with many of Howells' later works, the choice of text reflected a growing preoccupation with death and what lies beyond. • The Motet Beati quorum via, Op. 38, No. 3 was written by Charles Villiers Stanford (1852–1924) likely by 1890. In 1912, Stanford was teaching composition at the Royal College of Music where one of his students was Herbert Howells.
