The sung setting of the Eucharist is the Communion Service, Op. 71 by William Mathias (1934–1992).

MUSIC NOTES: The prelude to this service is the second of *Three Pieces for Organ*, written in 1998 by American composer *Aaron Travers (b. 1975)*. The composer writes: "It is a very slow lament using a simple chorale tune whose bass pattern is based on the [first] name of the dedicatee [Damin] (D-A-F-Bflat-G)." • The Offertory Anthem is by American composer *Jake Runestad (b. 1986)* who found in the words of Psalm 121 "great beauty in the admiration for natural creation linked with a promise of guidance and support from a higher power. ... I carefully shaped the melodic lines to mimic that of a mountainous landscape and the tone colors to the bold hues of where the hills meet the sky." • One composer that we cannot hear from in his own words is *William Byrd (c. 1540–1623)*, though one would love to hear an explanation from the composer about the abundance of cross-relations in his motet *O salutaris hostia*, a work presumably from the first part of his career.
