MUSIC NOTES: The final hymn tune, *Ladue*, was commissioned by St. Peter’s for the Hymn Festival celebrating the 150th anniversary of this parish held on November 4, 2018. It was written by *Stephen Buzard* (b. 1989), the Organist and Choirmaster of St. James Cathedral, Chicago. • The organ voluntaries at this service are by *Maurice Duruflé* (1902–1986), a student of Tournemire and Vierne, who became Organist of St. Etienne-du-Mont in Paris in 1929, a post he held until his death. • French organist *Jean Langlais* (1907–1991) was blind from childhood. Langlais, a student of Dupré and Dukas at the Paris Conservatoire, was a prolific composer. His *Messe solennelle* is considered his finest piece of church music. • *Grayston Ives* (b. 1948) was the Informator Choristarum (Director of Music) at Magdalen College, Oxford from 1991 to 2009. His anthem *Listen sweet Dove* is a setting of the poem “Whitsunday” by George Herbert (1593–1633). The word Whitsunday has been retained as part of the name of the Day of Pentecost throughout the Anglican Communion. It appears in our Prayer Book on pages 31, 175, and 227.
