MUSIC NOTES: "Draw us in the Spirit's tether" is a splendidly tuneful anthem by Harold Friedell (1905-1958), who was Organist and Master of the Choir at St. Bartholomew's Church in Manhattan. In 1957, Friedell was awarded an honorary Doctor of Sacred Music degree from Missouri Valley College. That same year, the melody of his famous anthem was adapted into a hymn tune, "Union Seminary." The tune is named after the institution where Friedell was on the faculty of the School of Sacred Music. • American composer Virgil Thomson (1896–1989) was born in Kansas City, Mo. Thomson was also "among the most influential and lasting [music] critics of the 20th century." My Shepherd will supply my need, was written in 1937. It is based on the American folk tune "Resignation," (Hymn 664) which first appeared in print in 1828. • Leo Sowerby (1895– 1968) was known as "the Dean of American Church Music." He wrote Carillon on July 23, 1917, while taking a break from building his summer cottage on the shore of Lake Michigan. • "The Stars and Stripes Forever" was composed on Christmas Day, 1896. At its premiere, it was described as "stirring enough to rouse the American eagle from his crag, and set him to shriek exultantly while he hurls his arrows at the aurora borealis." The arranger, E. Power Biggs (1906–1977) was well-known as a concert organist through his CBS radio broadcasts and Columbia recordings.
