MUSIC NOTES: Louis Vierne (1870–1937) was a brilliant musician, teacher, composer, and organist who was born blind. He competed against four other organists and won the position as organist at Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris in 1900. Legende is the first composition in the second volume of Vierne's Vingt-Quatre Pieces en Style Libre, a two-volume set of shorter compositions meant to serve as offertory music.

Toccata in Seven is a relatively early work by English composer *John Rutter (b. 1945)*, so named because of its asymmetrical meter of 7/8 time. Written in 1974, it represents one of the few non-choral works of the composer, who is well known for his founding and long association with the Cambridge Singers.
